## Librarian Reports On Book Buying

Dear Students,

What book did you request the Hialeah High Library to purchase? Very few requests are received from students—those that are made are given serious consideration and usually filled. The library welcomes constructive suggestions.

At present, the library has a collection of 16,000 books, meeting the standards the Southern Association has set up for our enrollment. The aim of the library is to exceed the standards as space and budget permit.

Some of the sources from which the books are chosen are the Standard Catalog for High School Libraries, lists of the National Council of Teachers of English, the New York Times Book Review section and the Library Journal. Our library duplicates most of the books found in the Young Moderns Room in the Miami Public Library.

Checking the best seller list of the New York Times Book Review section for Sunday, March 25, 1962, we find that better than one-fourth of the books listed are in the Hialeah High library... This is a good percentage when you consider the fact that some of the titles are not of interest to teen-agers.

Book orders may be sent only twice a year through the Dade County Board of Public Instruction and the allocation made by the county for books averages out to less than \$1.00 per student per year.

Available at the check-out desk in the library are forms for suggested titles of books to purchase. All suggestions will be considered. We will welcome, as we always have, your interest and participation in the continued growth of the Hialeah High Library.

## FFA Holds Flower Sale

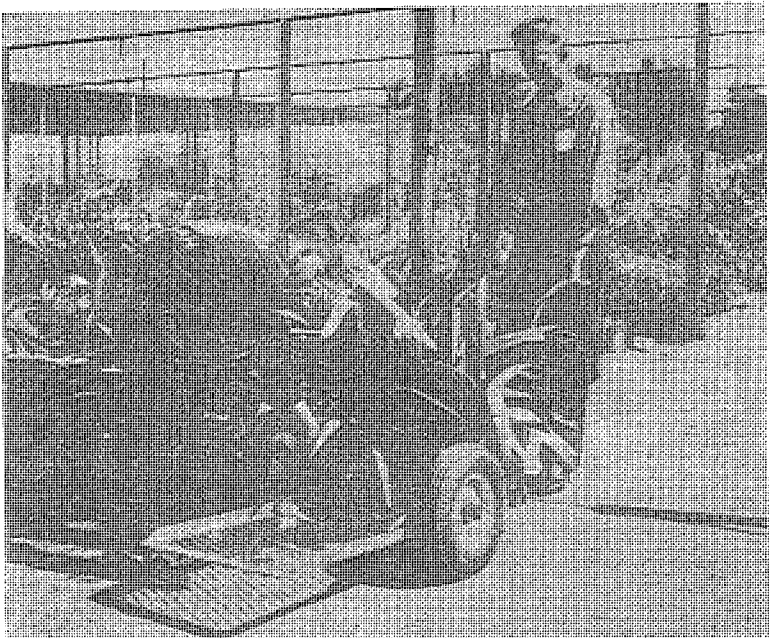
Hialeah's Agriculture Department, the Future Farmers of America, put on an Easter flower sale to raise money.

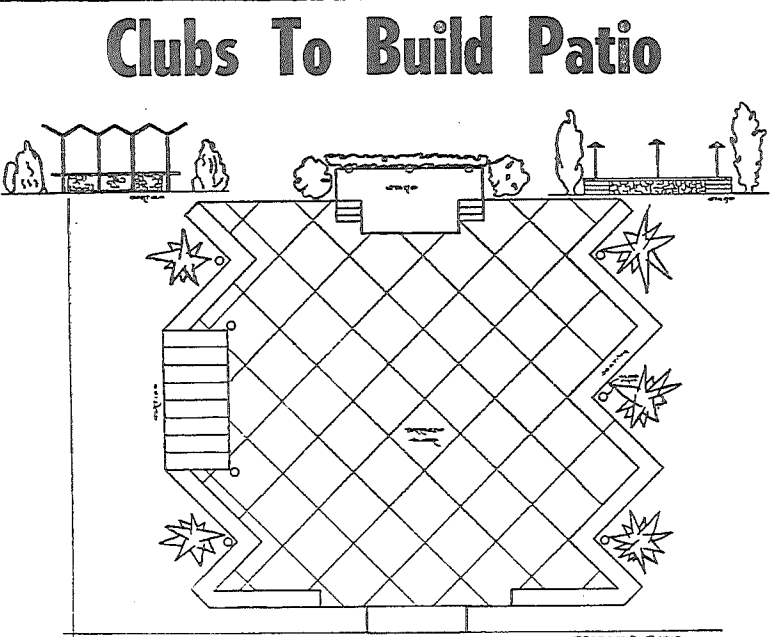
## Honorias Taps

The sportsday was held at Morningside Park.

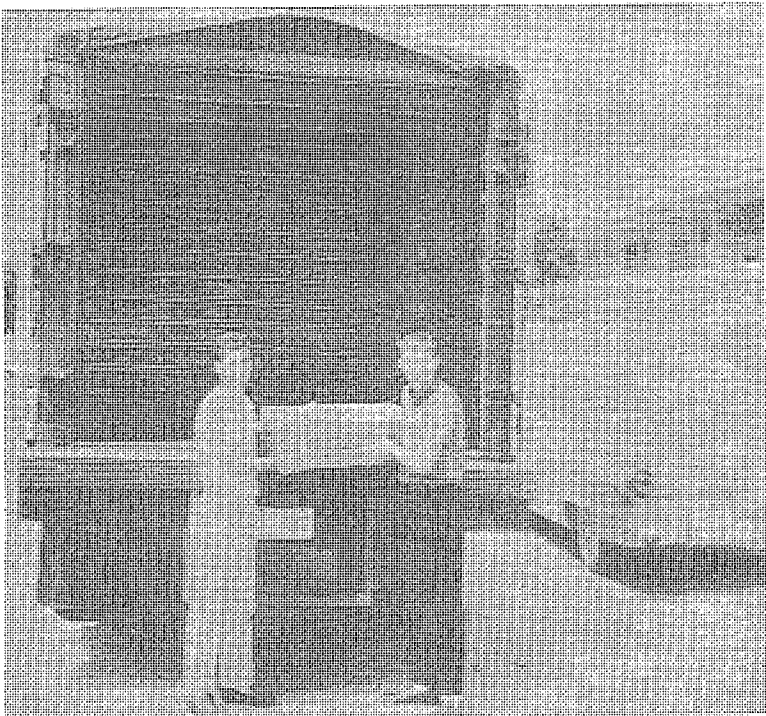

Hialeah took another step closer to the district title as they knocked off tough Miami Jackson 2-1 on the one-hit pitching of Richard Hough at Miami Field.

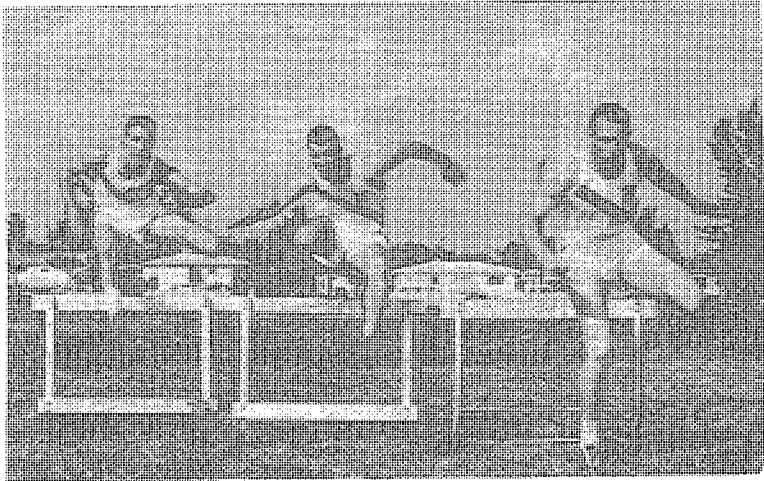

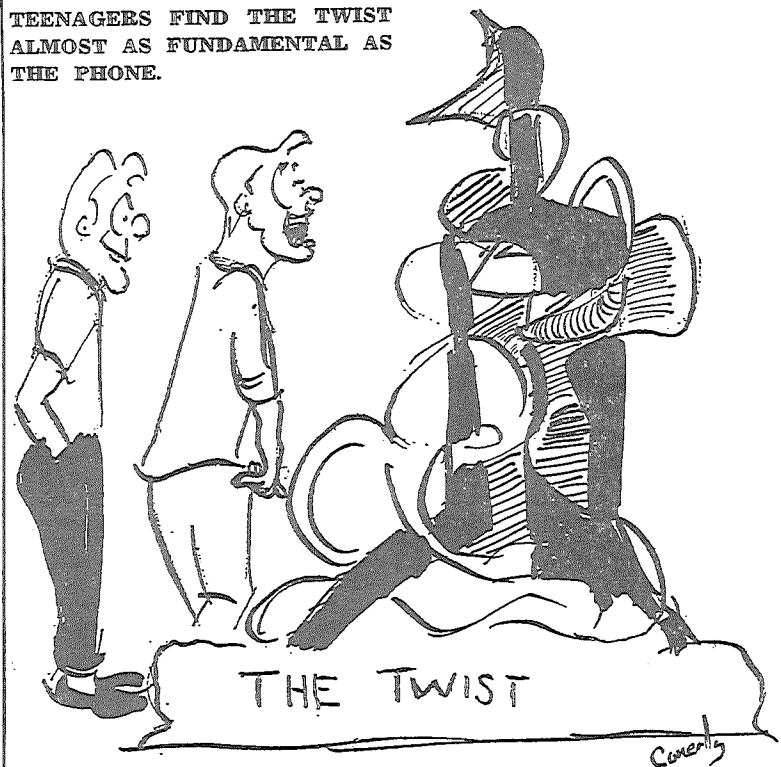
