
Nasty Book, Must Read

Why must high school students be cheated out of reading a best selling novel which to most of them would give a sensitive realistic picture of adolescent problems. The best seller is J. D. Salingers' "Catcher In The Rye," a book which is getting very bad publicity and criticism from many people who fail to understand its purpose and therefore cannot fully appreciate its significant quality Many of the people who have judged the novel carelessly in many cases haven't even read the book. These people must be labeled as ignorant. After an individual has read the book then and only then should he take the liberty to pass judgment.

People who fall into this category of intolerance and misunderstand Salinger's motives and his sincere purpose in writing Catcher In The Rye should not be allowed to dictate to others if they can read it or not. Most high school students that have read the book find it interesting as well as educationally enlightening. This book which deals with a problem, a very human problem. Naturally this problem is handled with utmost realism but it is also handled with caution and intelligence, so that it is quite evident that the individual reading Catcher In The Rye isn't attracted to the author's realistic outlook but his brilliant treatment of the character's problem which is all the more highlighted by the effective use of language and the imaginative situations.






Honor Courses Now Available




