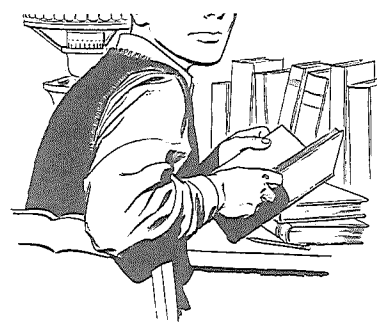

## Five Qualify For State

The Hialeah High Debate team qualified five of its six contestants for the state tournament at the University of Miami Saturday, February 9. The state tournament will be in Gainesville, February 28 through March 2. Linda Barger won first place in girl's extemporaneous speaking and the team composed of Karen Morahan, Yvonne Sapia, Larry Pederson, and Bruce Nierenberg tied for second place in debate with a 6-2 record. Ray Pederson went to the finals in boy's extemporaneous speaking.

This will be the largest group to be tapped. To be tapped, debaters must have earned 25 competitive points at least and be in the upper 2/3 of their class scholastically speaking. The tappers have to continue in excellence in speech activity. Tappers will elect their officers and will raise money for further N.F.L. activities.

# Reading Development Course Initiated Second Semester

A new permanent reading development program has been initiated at Hialeah High under the direction of Mrs. Virginia Reinecke. It will aid students in improving reading speed as well as teaching techniques for study improvement and reading comprehension. Mrs. Reinecke plans to work with 15 students in the regular English

classes where students may work independently. Honors English courses will spend only two weeks in the program while general courses will spend a month with the course and will delve more deeply into techniques. Approximately 600 students and 19 English teachers will have been involved in developmental reading at the close of this semester.

When she moved to Miami Shores December 1, Mrs. Reinecke had no intention of acquiring a fulltime teaching job immediately. She had been certified through Tallahassee before moving to Florida and through urging friends decided to apply as a substitute teacher until next fall when she would be able to find out more about Florida schools and student personalities. However, Mr. Theobald at Lindsay Hopkins suggested she come to Hialeah High the last of January, and as she conferred with Mr. Pease, he asked her to initiate the program on a fulltime basis. For the most part, developmental reading in this area is in its infancy—if there were more personnel, the course would become widespread.

Actually, the program is a fairly new one in Florida. Mrs. Reinecke spent four years teaching developmental reading at Highland Park High School in Highland Park, Illinois, and explained that the course had been in existence there for 14 years. Freshmen found it a six weeks compulsory course! for other students it was voluntary.

## Miss Hialeah Contest Opened To Contestants

Mr. J. D. Goins and Mr. Bob Hart, co-chairmen of the Miss Hialeah contest are looking for young girls interested in being contestants.

The winner must agree to appear as Miss Hialeah at any and all public affairs given by or in behalf of the Hialeah Jaycees.

The possible contenders for the title of Miss Hialeah must be 18 years of age by September 1963, and not over the age of 28. Girls must be single and not previously married.

Girls who qualify may obtain an entry blank from the chairman by calling TU 8-4742 or TU 8-3577 and obtain an official entry blank.

Contestants must display their talent for at least three minutes. They will also be judged on appearance in a bathing suit and in an evening gown.

The Miss Hialeah contest is a preliminary to the Miss America contest and the winner will be chosen to represent Hialeah at the Miss Florida contest, March 23 at the Municipal Auditorium.

## Silver Knight Entry Deadline Draws Near

The deadline for the Silver Knight entry is 3:00 P.M., Monday, March 11. This must be turned in to the department. The Silver Knight awards will be presented 13 categories. They are: English and literature, foreign language, mathematics, science, social studies, arts, athletics, journalism, music, speech and drama, citizenship and general scholarships.

The English and literature awards will be given for consistent achievement in the composition of prose or poetry, creative research, or projects applying literary works to current problems.

The foreign language award will be given for outstanding accomplishment in the field of foreign language. The candidates should have a good scholastic record in this field. Also, he should have exhibited special qualities of leadership and character in a foreign language club or society, or made unusual contributions to the advancement of foreign language study in his school, or made practical application of his foreign language skill to promote better international relations.

The mathematics award will be given for initiative toward achievement in higher mathematics and for keenness of endeavor to contribute to mathematical knowledge.

The science award will be given for advance work, inventiveness or outstanding service and achievement in the field of chemistry, physics, biology, earth sciences, physiology, electronics or other related science. A value of, social habits and attitudes that formulate the student's character are important consideration.

The social sciences awards will be given for achievement, leadership and character as applied to history,

economics, sociology, psychology, political science, world affairs or related subjects.

The arts awards will be given for exceptional use of talent or other artistic contributions on the field of industrial, practical or fine arts.

The athletic awards will be given for service beyond expectation in cheerleading, student management or other contributions to the spirit and success of the school athletic teams. Athletic accomplishments in any high school sport, or appearance on all-star selections and other evident of athletic prowess may be documented, but it should be coupled with evidence of leadership and character.

The journalism award will be given for outstanding activities in all phases of school publications, demonstrating exceptional skill in the writing of copy or the handling of advertisement, circulation, business or production details, as well as effective use of school publications providing leadership for worthwhile activities.

The music award will be given for exhibiting growth, leadership or service to school in music. Exceptional talent in vocal or instrumental music will be considered.

The speech and drama award for achieving an impressive record in public speaking, debate or any of the theater arts. The student may have had a starring role in high school plays and show promise for professional theater.

The citizenship award for an overall spirit of service and to operation in home responsibilities and school or community activities. He has "made the grade" by an unusual demonstration of courage and willingness to assume responsibility.

The school may take for consideration the top five or more students, selected strictly on the basis of grades earned in school work, and their performance in standardized tests.

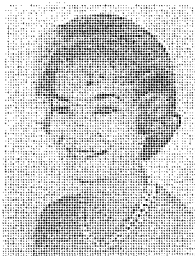
Siam, gave the viewers a hint about the play to encourage them to attend. Publicity was also given by articles in the Miami NEWS and the HOME NEWS.

# Success Of Debate Result Of Mr. Carey

Hialeah High's team has won more medals, trophies and awards this past year than they can count. Perhaps responsible for this tremendous success is debate coach Mr. Ralph Carey. Mr. Carey interned and substituted for one year at Hialeah before began teaching two years ago. Among the courses he has taught tenth and twelfth grade English, and all the speech and debate classes.



A native Miamian, Mr. Carey has lived in Hialeah for 17 years. He attended the University of Florida for seven years and received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees. Miami Jackson High School was Mr. Carey's alma mater only, "because Hialeah High wasn't built. I did go to Hialeah Junior High, though," he said. While attending Jackson, Mr. Carey participated in the debate team which won the Southern Championship in Dallas, Texas, 1954. He was also chosen outstanding senior debator.

At the U of F., Mr. Carey served as vice president of the student body. He also held two cabinet positions and wrote the new student body constitution and was chairman of three political parties on campus. A member of the Young Democrats, Mr. Carey debated only in his freshman year because, as he stated, "I wanted to become active in campus politics."

During his two years here at H.M.S., Mr. Carey has served as sponsor of National Forensic League. He feels that "Speech is the most worthwhile activities that students can participate in." Of his teaching career, Mr. Carey says "If I had a million dollars, I'd still be teaching. I enjoy working with young people and molding students with hidden potential into champions."

# Hialeah Curriculum Offers Many Varied Languages

Approximately 30 per cent of the student body of Hialeah is now engaged in the process of learning a language. The greatest concentration is among students taking Spanish, French or Latin. There are also students taking German and Russian.

The most popular language is Spanish, largely because of the large number of Spanish students attending Hialeah. These students have proved to be an added impetus and guide to the English student learning Spanish. But these classes also have a large Cuban enrollment too, and are

not confined to only English students.

The students taking Latin are doing so anticipating a career in science or math or for other specific reason. The two fields listed above are constituted largely of Latin references and terminology. But Latin is also the basis for all romance languages and the study of it makes learning a second language easier.

Students in the French, German and Russian classes are there because of a personal interest in the language or the country represented.

The Russian classes are new to Hialeah and to Dade County in general, since Hialeah is only the second school to offer the course. There is one teacher qualified to teach Russian, Mr. George Sirianni, and his class consists of 19 students. This class has proved to be

very interesting to all the students. Alexander Carasa had this comment to make of his class: "It is not difficult or extremely different. The same methods used in teaching other languages are used in teaching Russian. It has proved to be very interesting and has become a challenge."

The language classes have not only created "inguists," but also many language clubs. The Spanish students enjoy the privileges of Spanish Honor Society if they have a 3.2 average. The French club, just recently formed this year has a large membership and big plans for the future. There is a German club under the leadership of Miss Stux. The purpose of the clubs is to promote interests in a country and language. They strive to have entertaining meetings.

Mr. Sirianni, head of the language department, has this comment: "This is a small world and we must get along with people and have a knowledge of cultures other than our own. For that reason learning a language is a necessity." He recommends a language course for students concentrating on a business course. Employers often demand workers with an ability to speak more than one language, particularly in cities like Miami, where the majority of the people speak more than one language. Therefore it is important to be bilingual.

It is also important to the student seeking a career in science because some of the greater achievements in science are made by Germans or Russians and because of the lack of people who understand these languages many experiences go unheralded.

The language department has expanded to meet the needs of the growing enrollment among the courses, by adding additional teachers to the staff. There are now 12 teachers who are second to none in experience and ability on the staff.

Hialeah students, who have traveled to other countries create attractive displays and showcases for the student body to admire and to encourage interest in a language.

For those who are still wondering, Poe is a lovely blonde attending Miami High, but that really doesn't prove anything about Paul, as girls frighten him!

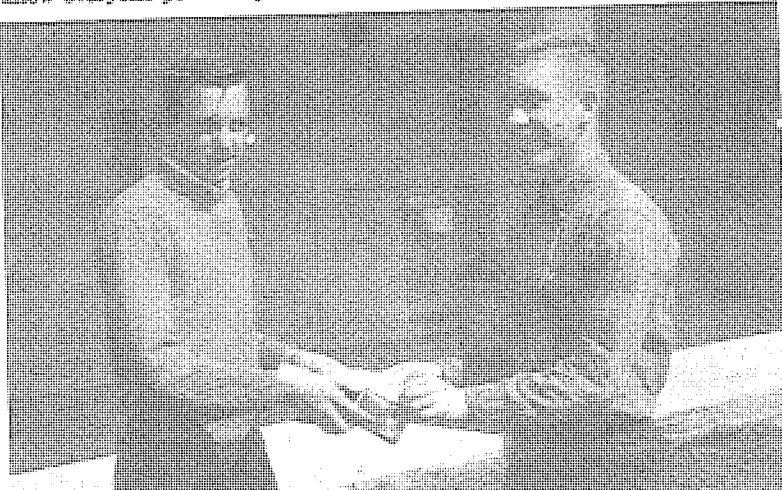
Eyeing the future, he would like to attend either Davidson College in North Carolina or Yale. He

## Communism Course Studied By Seniors

Government classes at Hialeah have begun to help the student develop a greater appreciation of American heritage, democratic processes, freedom of opportunity, and the will to preserve freedom of our country.

This will be done through a study of communism. The course will help the student to understand what the threat of communism means to the freedom of the people of the United States, and to achieve a way of understanding the evils of communism.

J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and also author of several books on the subject of communism, wrote in a letter to Thomas D. Bailey, Superintendent of Public Schools:

"I am fully cognizant of the importance of informing factually all students and adults concerning the real nature, purpose, methods, objectives, and dangers of communism to our free society."

The course in communism, according to Florida law must be 30 hours of class time.

# Distributive Education Program Offers Double Value To T-Breds

Distributive Education (DE) identifies a program of instruction which teaches marketing and distribution.

DE has four importances: importance to the student, to the school, to the community, and to the nation.

Each DE student is studying for a specific career objective which creates common interests and objectives.

DE is the "show window" for student achievement and progress thus contributing to the school's purpose of preparing well-adjusted employable citizens.

Students in DE are more favorably hired by many businesses because of their job interest and related school study of that particular business.

The instruction and club activities of DE constantly emphasizes the American system of competition and private enterprise. While attracting more of our nation's youth to study marketing and distribution, the total DE program becomes a vital necessity to our national security.

DE students elects its own student leaders.

National DECA is comprised of all State Associations. The national officers are elected by student delegates who are elected by each state. The National DECA policy is governed by DECA, Inc. which is the legal identity of the adult group responsible for the youth program of DECA.

The emblem is diamond shaped with the words "Distributive Education Clubs of America" surrounding a wrapped package. The four diamond points symbolize:

- 1) Vocational Understanding,
- 2) Civic Consciousness,
- 3) Social Intelligence,
- and 4) Leadership Development.

The wrapped package symbolizes the close cooperation of student, teacher, parent and merchant in assisting DE students to acquire a well-rounded education.

Distributive Education may be defined as a specialized education for those selling a service or a commodity, or those engaged in the marketing and merchandising occu-

pations involving customer contact.

Primary providers of employment for our Cooperative Distributive Education students here at Hialeah High School may be found in:

Wholesale Establishments-Wholesales, agents, brokers and salesrooms.

Service Establishments — Barber shops, beauty shops, cleaning, dyeing and pressing shops, shoe repair shops, laundries, sign painting establishments, adjustment and collection bureaus, and automotive repair shops.

drapes in the auditorium show case; (5)-attending Motinary Clinic every week; and (6)-taking care of the shoe check at the sock hops.

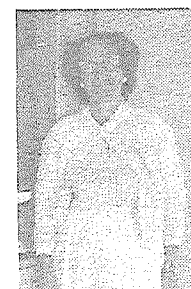
Many of those who attended the Dreamboat Nautical Cruise sponsored by Anchor last year will be happy to know that plans are under way for another trip this year.

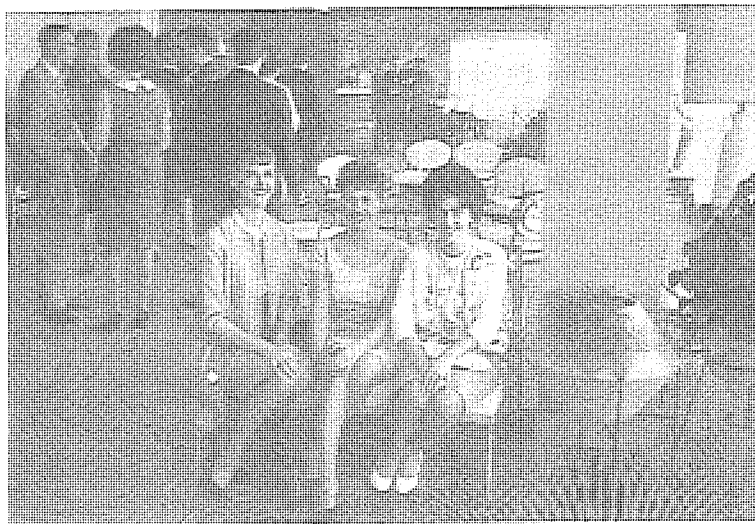

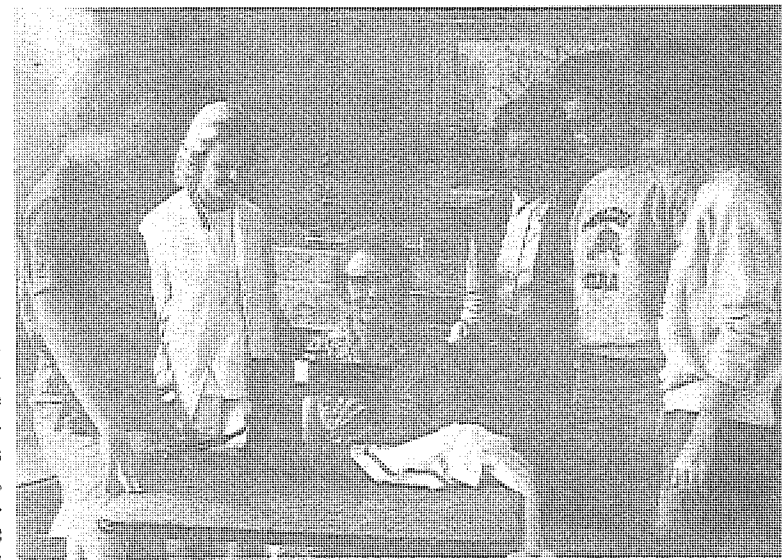

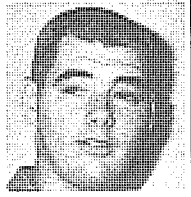
