Five Cents Buys A Scholarship



A total of 54 scholarships was awarded to students graduating from this institution last spring with a value of 165,101 dollars. There were still eight scholarships (value \$45 thousand) which were turned down by students who had won others and were unable to use them, and many went begging for recipients.

If a financial situation is such that the only way in which a student may attend college is through outside aid, then one must exhaust all possible means of aid in hopes of obtaining a scholarship.

An entire shelf has been set aside in the library for the express purpose of college and scholarship information. If you can't find information there, see your counselor. If he can't help you, send a nickel and write to a specific college. If you don't know whom to write to, try the Director of Admissions. The United States Government Printing Office, Wishington 25, D. C., has a plethora of inexpensive and free material available upon request.

Don't forget loans. Many institutions offer loans with a very minimal (usually three per cent) rate of pay back beginning one year after college graduation.

In any case, the field is larger than one may think, and there is no reason for a scholarship to go wanting.

DUTY TO BE INFORMED


