MANY INSTITUTIONS IN AND OUT OF FLORIDA TO BE REPRESENTED

Annual College Night will again be held in the Hialeah High School auditorium on Friday, November 8, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m.

Being represented at this evening affair will be a majority of the colleges in Florida, and in addition Stephens College for Girls in Missouri, Emory University, Harvard, Duke, and the various Military Academies in the United States. As before, the evening will be divided into two sessions to enable all participating students to become acquainted with two different colleges. Any student in the ninth through twelfth grade who is preparing to go to college or just thinking about it is invited to attend.

READ CATALOGUES

"It is important," stated counselor Miss Paula Brand, "to plan this night ahead by reading the college catalogues available in the school library. This would help you have a better understanding about college, and it can help to have you ask more sensible questions."

She also added that if a student who has not yet chosen the college would like to attend he would listen to the talks on two different col-

leges. This would open his view on college education.

Any additional information will be posted on the calendar designed by Larry Lee and Tom York which will carry all coming events and notify the student body about the college scholarships offered. This will be posted on the bulletin board across from the IBM room. Any special information should be obtained from a counselor.

UM Course Enrolls Two Here

Vincent Rusinak and Sergio Siller, seniors, are the only two students from Hialeah participating in the University of Miami course, "Introduction to Engineering". The course is a scholarship program for one semester with classes on each Tuesday night from 7 to 9 p.m. When the course is completed, each will receive two college credits applicable to graduation from college.

Requirements of the course were a B-plus average in mathematics (ranging through trigonometry) and an overall average in other academic areas. An interview was given to each applicant by Professor Murray I. Mantell, author of the course's text, *Orientation in Engineering*.

The course centers mainly around the slide rule. Students learn full use of the instrument in detail as well as the other fundamentals used by engineers and the basis of all different fields of engineering. There are 18 boys in the class

which consists of high school seniors and college freshmen. Stated Vinny. "To anyone considering engineering as a possible career, this course is very valuable."

T-Breds Seen On Television

A regular Saturday morning TV program, "Answers, Please" has as two of its panel members Bruce Nierenberg and Wayne Cail, both Hialeah Key Clubbers. The show is on the air live from 11:30 a.m. to noon and is sponsored by the Biscayne Kiwanis Club.

Moderator of the program is Kiwanian Ted Place, also head of the Greater Miami Youth for Christ. The program has four high school students and a guest speaker who is

an authority in the area related to discussion.

A general topic is discussed each week by the panel members and guest. Eminent persons who have appeared include Dr. Peter Masiko, president of Dade County Junior College who answered questions on "The Teen-Ager After High School Graduation"; Judge Arthur Massey, answering questions on "Teen-Agers and Drinking"; and Judge Ben Shepard who answered questions about the recently legislated curfew.

The program began last spring with Bruce and three boys from Jackson High on Sundays. Since then, the program has moved to Saturday mornings and Bruce is now co-ordinator of the program, making him responsible for obtaining panel members. Wayne appeared as a substitute this summer and did so well, that he now appears regularly.

The program is a public service of Channel 10, with the objective of Kiwanis to help teen-agers with their problems.

United Fund Underway

The United Fund drive got under way at H.H.S. October 21 and will continue through October 24.

CEEBS

If you intend to go to college and perhaps try for a scholarship, you may be required to take the CEEB or the College Entrance Examinations. Check in your college catalog to be sure. College admissions officers and scholarship sponsors look

upon your test scores as one kind of evidence of your ability to do college work. Your school record gives them additional evidence. When they consult both your school work and your test scores, they will get a better idea of your academic ability than they could by considering either one alone.

Offered are three test types: the SAT or Scholastic Aptitude test which is designed to measure how well you have developed verbal and mathematical skills, the Achievement Tests designed to measure your general level of achievement in a sub-

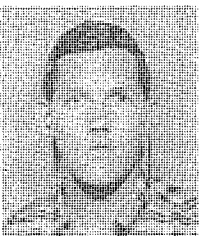

Five Cents Buys A Scholarship



A total of 54 scholarships was awarded to students graduating from this institution last spring with a value of 165,101 dollars. There were still eight scholarships (value \$45 thousand) which were turned down by students who had won others and were unable to use them, and many went begging for recipients.

If a financial situation is such that the only way in which a student may attend college is through outside aid, then one must exhaust all possible means of aid in hopes of obtaining a scholarship.

An entire shelf has been set aside in the library for the express purpose of college and scholarship information. If you can't find information there, see your counselor. If he can't help you, send a nickel and write to a specific college. If you don't know whom to write to, try the Director of Admissions. The United States Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., has a plethora of inexpensive and free material available upon request.

Don't forget loans. Many institutions offer loans with a very minimal (usually three per cent) rate of pay back beginning one year after college graduation.

In any case, the field is larger than one may think, and there is no reason for a scholarship to go wanting.

DUTY TO BE INFORMED

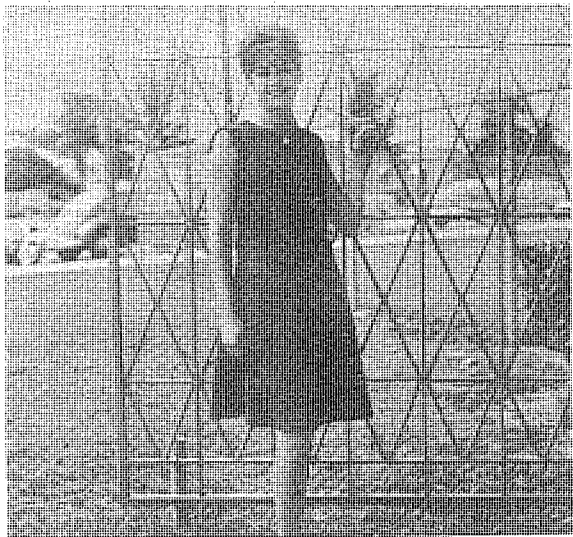

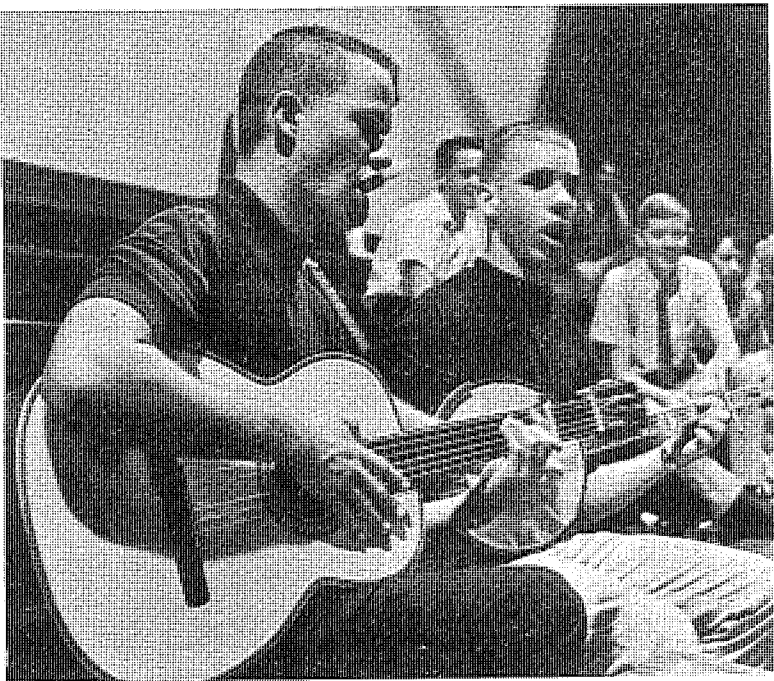
Classics Is Very Rarely Removed

The school sponsors are Mr. Kenneth Jenkins and Mrs. Irwin Richmond. The club sponsor is the Hialeah-Miami Springs Rotary Club with whom the possibility of having exchange members from foreign lands has been discussed.

Some of the many service projects Interact has are ushering at the football games, collecting for Muscular Dystrophy, distributing football game schedules, bringing the cheerleaders onto the football field in the Interact car and putting the books back in the library after the construction.

Future Interact sponsored dates include a sock hop November 1 after the Palmetto game, the Sadie Hawkins Dance in November and the Homecoming Dance co-sponsored with Anchor.

The club, which holds its meetings every other Monday at 7:30 p.m., will be tapping after the first

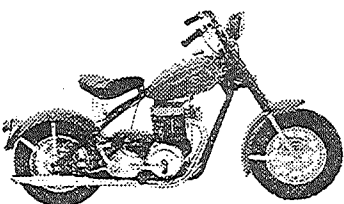

ject field, and the Writing Sample which is a one-hour essay writing exercise.

The test fees are: Scholastic Aptitude Test, \$5, Achievement Tests (any one, two or three taken on a single date), \$7.50, and the Writing Sample (no fee if taken with one or two Achievement Tests on a single date), \$2.

You must register with your counselor by November 23 if you want to take the test at Hialeah on December 7.

ACT

The American College Testing (ACT) Program is an admissions, scholarship, guidance and placement test battery designed to provide helpful information and service to colleges, to high schools, and to you, the student, at a time when it is most useful.

It consists of four tests: English, mathematics, the social studies and the natural sciences. Each averages 45 minutes in length.

This test is used mostly by the Southern colleges.

Four testing dates are offered at Miami-Dade Junior College: November 9, February 15, April 25 and June 20. The registration deadlines for these dates are: October 12, January 25, April 4 and June 6. The fee is \$4.

SENIOR PLACEMENTS

The Senior Placement Tests will be given to all seniors on October 30 and 31.

Spirit Records Sold By Band

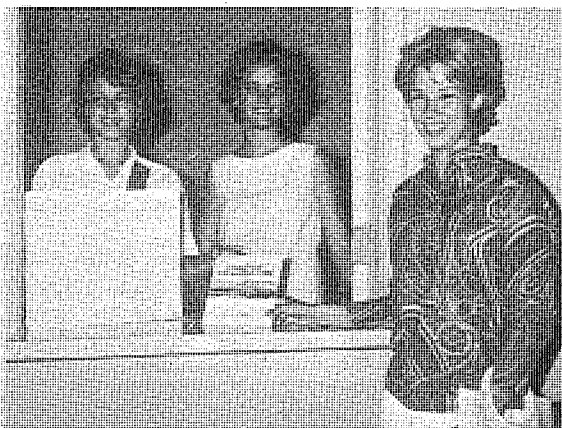

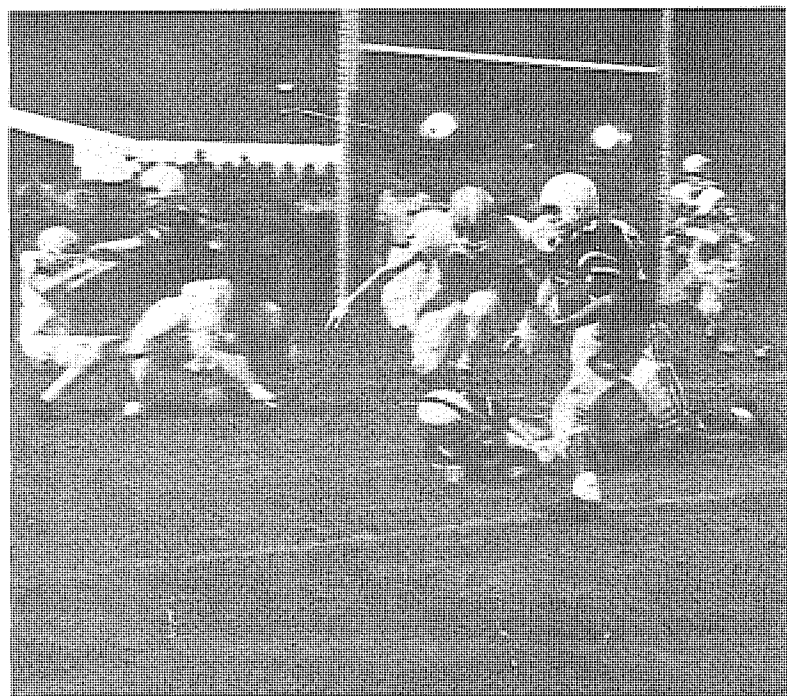

The Thoroughbreds had many early scoring opportunities, but finally capitalized on Wayne Melching's interception and run back to Curley's 19. Two successive five-yard penalties put the ball on the 29. Halfback Edgar Ornes ran to the 13, and Caldwell scored on the next play.

Early scoring opportunities missed included a recovered fumble on the Curley 44, a recovered fumble on the 26, and a short Curley punt to the Hialeah 48.

Curley cashed in on a blocked punt by Jim Patterson to score.

With the ball on Hialeah's 15-yard line, Curley moved the ball to the nine where Quarterback Rene Torrado hit end Don Raye with a touchdown pass. On the try for extra point, junior Mike Turner crashed through to block the kick and preserve Hialeah's lead 7-6.

The game became a battle of punts with Hialeah kicking six and Curley nine until Ted "Green Giant" Hendricks blocked a Curley punt on the three-yard line. Halfback Ornes ran end for the necessary yards to paydirt. Sturges added the extra point for a 14-6 lead.

Cavaliers Slay Hialeah 10-0

An overflowing crowd of 11,000 jammed Municipal Stadium as well as the new end zone seats and witnessed one of the most thrilling gridiron battles of this football season. Highly touted Gables was led by their jack-of-all-trades Larry Davidson, the quarterback.

Hialeah had an inspired offense as they marched down the field, but the clock ran out.

The T-Bred defensive line was outstanding, led by Ted Hendricks with many key tackles. Both line-backers John Fowler and Tom Kaighin turned in fine performances. Kaighin also recovered two Cavalier fumbles. Backfield standout was Pat Gispert, who also played in the half back slot. His most important role of the evening was when he made the final tackle of the first half. It cut off what could have been an added seven points.

J.V.'s Make Good

The Hialeah High Junior Varsity, nicknamed the Yearlings by Varsity coach Jim Powell, started out very successfully in their football season by sweeping to a pair of victories in the first two weeks of play.

Their first triumph was over "Little" Jackson Generals 13 to 6 at a wet Curtis Park. Rain poured constantly over the field but failed to stop the Yearlings, as Len Knight and Bill Engstrom ran for touchdowns against a soaked Jackson defense.

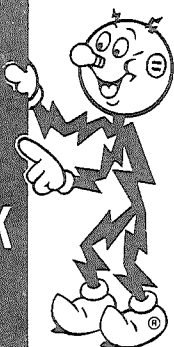
